



We came to honor Erlend and to comfort Ruth, the love of his life. All to wish Erlend safe journey into Heaven.

Erlend was born in Turlock, CA. His life took him to Merced, San Francisco, Agana, Guam, and after graduating from Cal Poly, settling in Santa Maria. He worked for Lockheed Missiles and Space at Vandenberg AFB, working on **Thor**-Agena Spacecraft and payloads launched from Atlas and Titan boosters. He retired after 40 years.

Of course, he would eventually get something from **Thor** that was not a spacecraft (though some may say they look like one), but an Airstream that took him on frequent journeys in which he made many friends. Erlend had many things he loved in life. Clocks, Barbeques, and something his Airstream friends rarely saw him without; his camera. Erlend took great joy in taking pictures and his camera was often trained on several of his fellow Airstream members. Some of which ended up in the Tattler.

Erland loved to take things apart to see how they were made. He then reassembled them, making them work better than before. He was a master builder of furniture; even ones made of cardboard. That was Erlend. A talented man. A gentle man. A kind man. A man who will be missed by many. Three wonderful daughters and their husbands, extended family, neighbors, just about everyone Erlend touched. In nearly 87 years, he touched plenty of hearts along his journey in this life. That included Toby, a 4 legged fur-friend.

WBCCI MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL FOR 2018

WBCCI International is ready to begin accepting membership renewals. Starting this month, members of the Central Coast California Unit can begin to renew their membership for calendar year 2018. While your dues are not technically due this early, those who choose to be proactive can begin the renewal process.

International dues remain at \$65.00 and the Central Coast California Unit dues remain \$15.00. Individuals who want to have or retain their names in the master Blue Beret issue published in January, need to have their renewals submitted directly to International to be received by them not later than November 1, 2018. If the Treasurer is submitting your dues to International, then dues must be received by PayPal or by mail not later than October 20th, giving sufficient time for them to be sent to International on or before November 1st.

There are several ways in which to renew your membership:

1) Sending \$80.00 directly to International in Jackson Center, Ohio. The web address is http://wbcci.org/. Click the tab, Renew Online Today, answer the questions, and make sure the unit you select the Central Coast California Unit. Our unit is under Region 12 and the Unit number is 20. The form automatically lists the International Dues at \$65.00 and the Unit dues at \$15.00.

When you complete the information and hit submit you will be taken directly to PayPal where you can use your PayPal account or pay by credit card.

You can also print out the form and mail a check for \$80.00 directly to International:

- 2) Renewing on the Central Coast California website: http://centralcoastairstream.wbcci.net/ Click on the Membership tab and complete the form. Once the form is complete and you hit submit, you will be taken to the unit PayPal. If you do not have a PayPal account, you can set one up or use a credit card to pay. Under this system, the Unit will release the funds from PayPal into the CCC bank account. The Unit will retain the \$15.00 and forward through Bank of America bill pay, the International Dues to International in Ohio. The Unit will prepare the paperwork to submit to International. If you use the Unit PayPal, add an additional \$2.70 (total \$82.70) to cover the costs charged by PayPal.
- 3) At the Central Coast California website, you have the option to print out the membership form in a pdf (Adobe Acrobat) version. Complete the form and then mail it with an \$80.00 check to:

The entire check will be deposited to the Unit Checking Account and the International dues and Renewal paperwork will be forwarded to International in Jackson Center, OH.

4) Affiliates need to renew by check. International does not accept Unit dues by themselves. The renewal fee is \$15.00 and the check should made out to Central Coast Unit WBCCI and sent to:

In order to remain an Affiliate with the Central Coast California Unit, the member must insure that they renew their full membership with their host unit. Those dues can be sent to International directly or to the appropriate address of their host unit.

5) Any individual who no longer owns an Airstream trailer or RV is still eligible for either full or affiliate membership as long as they do not purchase a non-Airstream trailer or RV.

The Central Coast California is looking forward to having all of our wonderful members and affiliates back with us for 2018 and new adventures in Airstreaming.

The Tech Corner

Airstream Energy Consumption by Ray Bell, NorCal Unit

Definitions:

- Energy
 - Heat, ability to do work, mass in motion, etc.
 - Calorie + 1 gram water 1 degree centigrade = 4.2 Joule
- Power
 - o Energy per second
 - o Watt= 1 Joule per second
- Battery Energy
 - o Chemical storage, (when it is full)
 - Battery converts chemical energy into electric energy
- Battery Power
 - Larger battery = more power and energy
 - Smaller battery = less power and energy

Electrical Energy and Power

- Water Analog (Analogy)
 - o Garden Spray
 - Small high pressure stream :Large low pressure stream
 - Similar force similar ability to do the work
 - Voltage: Water source = Volts
 - o Current: Stream size = Amps
- Electrical Power
 - Voltage time Current = Watts
- Battery energy rating
 - o Amp hours @ about 12 volts. Your converter reduces 110 to 12 volts, to support lights, television sets, radio, etc. It takes 110 to run either the air conditioner or microwave (not both at the same time) and cannot operate on

battery power. Battery power can operate all 12 volt items. The examples give you an idea of the demand on your battery, especially when dry camping.

Battery Energy Ratings

- From Interstate Battery Website
 - o A 12-volt 100amp hour rated marine battery means that 5 amps can be discharged for 20 hours at 80 degrees Fahrenheit (26.7 Celsius) before falling below 10.5 volts (6 battery cells X 1.75 volts) (Interstate battery web site)
- Usage example when applied to a 2014, 25' Airstream International
 - Visibly all off but battery disconnect I connected position, LPG warning on =
 0.20 amps
 - o Fantastic Fan, one is use, .08 amps, two in use, 1.36 amps
 - o Refrigerator one LP, .72 amps
 - o Kitchen shelf inside lamps, .043 amps
 - o Kitchen shelf outside lamps, 0.30 amps
 - Door step lamp, outdoor light, .011 amps
 - Over table inside shelf lamps, .044 amps
 - o Hall lamps (LED) full bright 1.00 amps
 - o Hall lamps (LED) full dim, o.05 amps
 - o Bedroom ceiling lamps (LED) full bright, 0.55 amps
 - o Bedroom ceiling lamps (LED) full dim, 0.03 amps
 - o Bedroom shelf lamps 0.43 amps
 - o Bedroom reading lamp, 0.15 each
 - o Bathroom lamps, .030 amps
 - $\circ~$ Radio, at least 1.00 amps. Likely no more than 2.0 $\,$
 - o Storage unit lamps, 0.07
 - o Hot water heater in LP mode?
 - Stove lights? Replaced with LED
 - o Refrigerator light?
 - o Furnace?

• Given two batteries able to supply 5 amps for 20 hours each, or 5 amps for 40 hours together.

- Energy Hogs
 - o The real hog is the furnace and its electronics
 - o Another hog is a 110 Converter

The information supplied is not meant to make you an electrical genius. It is designed to inform you about energy usage. If you are dry camping and totally relying on your battery to provide for your needs, and your batteries are at full charge, you would have less than two full days of battery life.

Using example one, 4.6 amps divided into 40 hours = 8.69 remaining hours of battery usage.

Using example two, 6.2 amps divided into 40 hours = 6.45 remaining hours of battery usage.

No individual is going to use all of the items listed using either 4.6 or 6.2 amps. The concept here is to realize how much demand is made on your batteries.

If you are connected to shore power in an RV Site, at 30 amp site, you have to consider how many other rigs are there, how much demand for every unit in every occupied site. If it is a hot day and air conditioners are operating, the demand on the RV Park system can easily overwhelm it and potentially cause a power failure.

Understanding the demands your Airstream makes using the various electrical components, will help to preserve battery power or not overload the site power grids.

If you use an inverter to convert battery power to 110 volts, using an electric hairdryer or the microwave can reduce your battery power rapidly. LED TV sets use less power and are safer for limited use.

If you have a generator you can save your battery. When dry camping, be careful where you place your generator and protect it from theft when out in the open. Also, insure, when dry camping for an extended period, you have sufficient fuel to operate your generator.

Be energy smart, especially when dry camping. Don't be an energy hog. And although a different subject, keep in mind propane usage, especially when using your furnace to heat your trailer.
